

**SEVEN TORONTO NAMES
 IN NEW CASUALTY LIST**

Lieut. A. E. Smith Killed in Action—Capt. E. C. Culling Presumed Dead.

The latest casualty list issued by Ottawa contains seven Toronto names. Lieut. A. E. Smith, 220 Harbord street, is reported killed in action, and Capt. E. C. Culling is presumed dead. One man has died of wounds, two have been wounded, and two previously reported wounded are now said to be ill. Since the beginning of the week there have been 76 local casualties reported as compared with 117 for the same period last week.

PTE. D. MANN ILL.

Pte. Daniel Mann, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Mann, reside at 225 Runnymede road, is reported ill for the third time since he went overseas in November, 1915. While training at Stanley Barracks he was kicked in the side by his horse. He recovered sufficiently to go to England, but after arriving suffered a relapse. He has been in the hospital in England most of the time since he went over and has undergone three operations. Recently he became well enough to go to France, but was there only three weeks before his old injury began to trouble him again, and he was sent to the hospital. He is 21 years old, and worked for Swift and Company.

SEVEN FROM ONE FAMILY.

The home of Mrs. Burnett, at 2 Cambridge avenue, is represented by seven soldiers on active service, her husband, his three brothers and her three brothers. A telegram has arrived stating that her husband, Gunner Jack Burnett, was dangerously wounded and in Gnr. J. Burnett, No. 42 Casualty Clearing Station on September 21. He is 29 years of age and was employed at the Don Valley Brick Works. His three brothers, William, Harry and Ernest, two of whom have been wounded, are at the front. Mrs. Burnett has two brothers serving in Egypt and one in Essex, England.

 Despatches.**

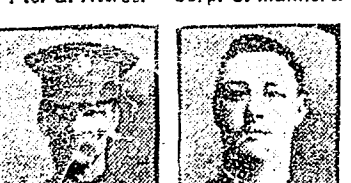
"I have it in command from his Majesty the King to inform you as next of kin of the late Pte. E. T. Attree."

Attree, of the Royal Sussex Regiment, that this private was mentioned in a despatch from Field Marshal Sir John French, dated the 31st May, 1915, and published in the London Gazette, dated 22nd June, 1915, for gallant and distinguished service in the field.

"His Majesty desires to condole with you on the loss you have sustained, and to express his high appreciation of the services of the late Pte. B. R. Attree."

The above letter is in the proud possession of Corp. A. Attree, 88 Deaconsfield avenue, whose six sons donned the King's uniform in defence of the Empire. Pte. B. R. Attree, to whom the letter refers, died of wounds in Paris on Jan. 27th, 1915. Pte. A. Attree left Canada with a Grenadier battalion in 1914, and was wounded while shrapnel in April, 1915. He has since returned home. Gunner E. Attree went over with the 69th Battery two years ago. After four months' service he was kicked by an artillery horse and returned to Canada in August, 1916. Ptes. G. Attree and W. Attree have been serving since the outbreak of war with the 2nd Middlesex Regiment. Corp. C. Mannert enlisted in Peterboro. He has won one medal and been recommended for another, while the father himself, Corp. A. Attree, was rejected from the 128th Peel Battalion, but rejoined the Royal Engineers, in which he is now serving.

AVIATOR IS MISSING

Flight-Lieut. Neil J. Taylor Was a Graduate of University of Toronto.

Information reaching Mrs. Hanna Taylor, Flight-Lieut. Neil J. Taylor, formerly of 1 Salem avenue, is missing. He received his training in the University Officers' Training Corps, and, after going to England a year ago, received further instruction with the Royal Flying Corps, crossing to France last month. When enlisting he was in his second year at the University studying law. A brother, Flight-Lieut. Samuel M. Taylor, also received his training with the University O. T. C., and since going to England last February has joined the Royal Naval Air Service. Previous to going overseas he was in his second year at the School of Practical Science. The parents reside in Regina, Sask., their father being a retired farmer.

PTE. GILES WOUNDED.

Pte. Clifton E. Giles has been wounded by gunshot in wrist and taken to No. 26 General Hospital, Etaples, France, according to word sent to his wife at 9 Fairmount crescent. He is 28 years of age and was formerly a gardener near Lakefield, Ont.

Pte. C. E. Giles, Mrs. Giles' brother, Pte. Reginald Akers, is serving in England, and her father, Corp. F. Akers, has been returned to Toronto as medically unfit, over age.

PTE. TITUS RETURNING

Silverthorne Mdn, Wounded at Vimy Ridge, Has Been Overseas Over a Year.

Silverthorne, Sept. 27.—Mrs. Titus, of lot 23 Silverthorne avenue, has received word from her husband, Pte. R. J. Titus, stating that he expected to arrive home soon. He is at present in Torquay, England. He has been incapacitated for further active service on account of injuries received to his arm during the Vimy ridge engagement. He has been overseas since August 13, 1916, and in France since Christmas. He is married and has one little boy. He was born in Markham 36 years ago, but has lived in Toronto practically all his life. Prior to enlistment he worked at the Standard Fuel Company plant.

**CANADIAN CASUALTIES
 AN ERROR IN NAMES,
 LT. A. E. SMITH KILLED**

His Home in Harbord Street, Toronto—List of Dead and Wounded.

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—A similarity in names has again resulted in the wrong officer's family being notified of their relative being a casualty. On August 23rd of this year, Lieut. Albert Edward Smith was reported to his wife, now in England, but formerly of Carberry, Man., as having been killed in action. To-night's casualty list rectified the error and reports Lieut. A. E. Smith, of 320 Harbord street, Toronto, as having been killed in action, August 22nd.

In the list which contains 66 names, 8 Canadian soldiers are reported killed in action, 8 died of wounds, and 24 presumed to have died, one wounded and missing, and one missing. The balance are wounded and ill.

OF FIGHTING STOCK

Pte. W. S. Mannering, Who Has Been Wounded, Has Long Line of Fighting Ancestors.

According to official word received by Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Mannering, 1470 Queen street west, their son, Pte. W. S. Mannering, was admitted to the 3rd Field Ambulance Depot Hospital, Sept. 17, suffering from gunshot wounds in the face. He had been in Pte. W. S. Mannering, 25 years of age, and was born in Toronto.

He comes of fighting stock and has four cousins in the present war. One uncle served eight years in India, one served in South Africa, and another in Zululand, all with British regulars. Two great-uncles served in the Crimea, going through Sebastopol, Balaklava and Inkerman unharmed. They served with the Royal Horse Artillery. His great-grandfather fought at Waterloo.

PTE. CONNELL WOUNDED.

Word has come to Mrs. Connell at 96 Caslaw avenue that her son, Pte. W. H. Connell, was wounded by gunshot in the hand Sept. 14th, but remains on duty. He enlisted in a York Rangers battalion at Newmarket and has been in France since October.

Pte. W. H. Connell tober 11 last. He is 24 years of age, and his wife is now at Holland Landing, Ont. Last fall an officer wrote to say he was shell-shocked but recovered.

CORP. BOXALL DEAD.

Lance-Corporal A. G. Boxall of 1083 St. Clarens avenue, who was recently reported wounded and later said to be ill, has succumbed to his injuries. He was also wounded in October last year. He was a native of England who had lived in Canada 8 years.

His parents reside Corp. A. Boxall at Newtonbrook, Ontario.

Will Winter at Guelph. Guelph, Sept. 23.—The 6th Battery, which has been stationed during the summer at Peiawawa, arrived in the city, where they will take up their winter quarters.
